On behalf of my board colleagues, I'm honored to share this report on the continued efforts of UHSFAA to provide resources for our school and foster a penguin alumni community.

A major accomplishment this year was the creation of the Carolyn Kemmeries Endowment. With a lead donation from the UHSFAA matched by friends and family of former Principal Carolyn Kemmeries, a sustained fund has been created to support microgrants for costs associated with educational opportunities, including among other uses: academic supplies, extra-curricular or academic program participation fees, college application costs, etc. Grants are meant for students in need or with extenuating circumstances and create opportunities by removing financial barriers. Another important moment celebrated this year was a small Hall of Fame event in honor of English teacher Kris Tully, who taught at UHS from 1990 - 2016. Bus Tour of In-State Colleges for UHS Juniors



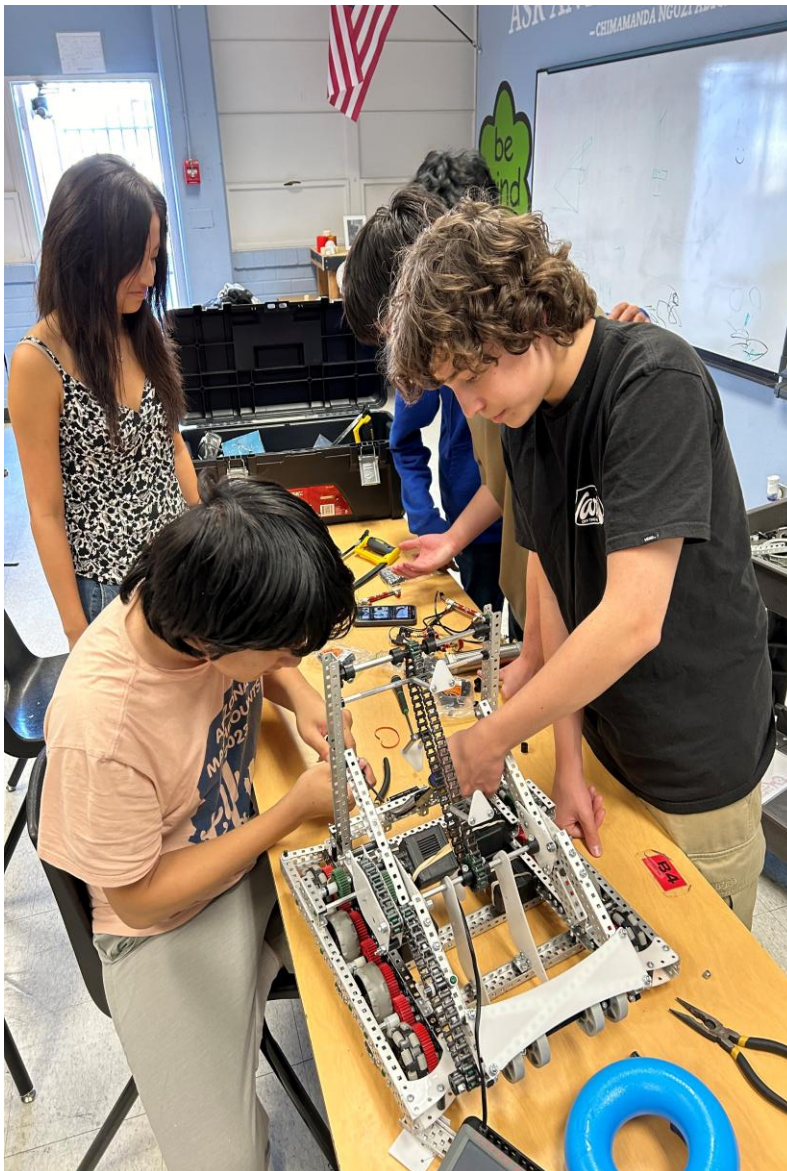

To ensure equal access, the UHSFAA provides financial support to students who may not otherwise be able to afford the cost of participating in the tour. New Equipment for the Robotix Team

From UHS Teacher, Benjamin Ancharski:

I want to thank UHS supporters for their gifts in helping VEX Robotics last year. Using the generous grant that we received, VEX was able to buy a practice field, our most important and most expensive yearly purchase. Each year, students in VEX must build a new robot to reflect the changing game rules, which also includes using a new playing field. To qualify for state tournaments, students must keep up to date with an ever-changing list of parts and field elements. Last year, we had the pleasure of sending two of our three teams to Phoenix for the Arizona VEX State Tournament, with one of the teams placing among the top 16 teams (out of 50). The assistance of this funding allows students to stay competitive against other VEX teams, apply their understanding of engineering and physics, and foster a rich cooperative experience among the students. Students in VEX are dedicated, academically brilliant, and community-minded. Allowing for the continuation of this club provides a creative outlet to apply STEM in a fun and competitive environment. As a UHS alumnus myself, I appreciate seeing the support from former students who care for their old high school community. From the students, thank you again.



Dance Costumes

"This generous grant from UHSFAA allowed us to diversify and expand our costume closet, providing students with wider range of costumes to choose from when completing their choreography projects. Most notably, the grant funded costumes for a new work, "Barn Dance," a tribute to the folk culture and dances of the Appalachian region of the United States. Students in Ivesia (Dance 5/6) performed this piece along with other student choreography projects in our fall elementary school tours. Other Impacts

The UHSFAA provided grants to UHS students to cover academic and program fees, as well as supplies, in support of their academic endeavors including:

- Tuition for nine (9) UHS students to take Engineering 102 at the University of Arizona as part of a dual enrollment program
- Fees for students to take AP exams, enabling them to receive college course credit
- Fees to attend a leadership conference
- Tuition and books to enroll in an American Sign Language Course at Pima Community College
- Business attire for college interviews
- Band/Winter Guard student fees
- Bike and helmet for a student in need of transportation to school



IMPACT - SCHOLARSHIP

This 4-year college scholarship is awarded annually to one UHS student applicant who best exemplifies the criteria set out by founder and former Principal Dr. Henry J. Pilote, Jr. and his wife, Angelina E. Pilote.

The objective of the Dr. Henry J. Pilote, Jr. and Angelina E. Pilote Scholarship is to recognize all-around excellence and achievement by high school graduates. The character and integrity of the student are among the most important criteria sought after by the Pilote Scholarship. The student should be a “doer” known for honesty, leadership and the ability to take responsibility for his/her actions.

For the 2024-25 school year, the scholarship provides a one-time payment of **\$10,000**.

Connor McGreal University High School Class of 2012 UHSFAA Donor

The University High School Foundation and Alumni Association is deeply grateful for every alum, parent, and friend who chooses to support UHS. To better understand the motivations behind these generous contributions—and to celebrate the individuals who make them—we're launching a donor spotlight featuring our alumni and donors. As the initial profiled donor, Connor McGreal graciously shared reflections on his time at UHS, what he's been doing since graduating in 2012, and why he chose to include the UHSFAA in his philanthropic plans.

When asked about a favorite memory from his time at UHS, Connor doesn't point to a single standout moment. Instead, he describes his high school years as a "happy blur" filled with friendship, academic rigor, and school spirit. "I look back on my time there as a happy blur," he says. "My favorite memories revolve around my circle of friends and our dedicated teachers and coaches. Representing UHS on the RUHS football team, balancing a significant academic workload, and being around so many driven classmates—I took the unique environment for granted at the time, but in hindsight, I'm very grateful to have been a part of it."

One teacher who made a lasting impact on Connor was Mr. Robert Schmidt. His Engineering class during senior year helped steer Connor toward a future in Engineering. "Mr. Schmidt was my favorite teacher. His patience, combined with a fun teaching style, set me up for success. That class helped me find direction heading into college."

After graduating from UHS in 2012, Connor attended the University of Arizona, where he earned a degree in Mechanical Engineering with a minor in Math. He credits UHS with preparing him for the intensity of college coursework—especially in the notoriously challenging early years of an engineering program. "The heavy workload at UHS made my first couple of years of college feel less daunting in comparison. While I wasn't coasting by any means, I had already developed study habits, time management, and organizational skills that helped me stay grounded. I was ready."

Now living in Philadelphia, Connor remains connected to UHS from afar through his recurring monthly gift to the UHSFAA—a contribution sparked by a conversation with fellow alum (and UHSFAA board member) Marcus Montano. "Marcus gave me some light-hearted ribbing about the \$20 I spend without thinking every month—and he was right. I realized I could easily redirect that into something meaningful. I was also excited by the opportunity to give back to my hometown high school in any way I could." Connor says that setting up a recurring monthly donation has made supporting UHS both simple and rewarding. "Absolutely—it's easier this way. I wouldn't even notice the donation amount in my monthly budget if not for the reminder emails. And far from being an annoyance—they're actually uplifting. It feels good to be reminded monthly that I'm contributing to the future generations lucky enough to find themselves at UHS."

The UHSFAA establishes the Carolyn Kemmeries Endowment

Carolyn Wilcox Kemmeries was a beloved educator, mentor, and community leader whose legacy continues to shape the University High School (UHS) community. Born in 1935 in Stronghurst, Illinois, Carolyn moved to Tucson in the early 1950s and earned both her B.A. and M.A. from the University of Arizona. She began a lifelong career in education, serving as a teacher, counselor, Assistant Principal, and ultimately Principal of UHS from 1986 to 1993. Her visionary leadership, charisma, and unwavering dedication helped mold UHS into one of Arizona's top schools. She was later honored for her contributions by being inducted into the UHS Hall of Fame in 2016 as one of the founding members of the school.

Known for her deep empathy, infectious laugh, and lifelong belief in the power of education, Mrs. Kemmeries was a tireless advocate for students of all backgrounds. She created safe spaces for students in her classroom, encouraged countless young people to pursue higher education, and remained involved in public service through her roles on the TUSD Board of Education and the University of Arizona Alumni Association.

After her passing in June 2023, her family—led by daughters Kay and Kristi—requested that those wishing to honor her memory contribute to a fund that would continue her life's work. With donations from the community and a matching contribution from the University High School Foundation and Alumni Association (UHSFAA), the Carolyn Kemmeries Student Support Endowment was established.

The endowment supports the Carolyn Kemmeries Student Grants, which provide financial assistance to students—especially first-generation college-bound students and those from families with limited economic resources. These grants reflect her lifelong commitment to educational equity and opportunity for all.

The UHSFAA is proud to steward and continue to fundraise for this endowment, ensuring that Mrs. Kemmeries' legacy of compassion, excellence, and access to education lives on for generations to come.

Flinn Scholars

The Flinn Scholarship is Arizona's most prestigious merit-based award for high-achieving high school seniors, offering a full-ride scholarship to attend the University of Arizona, Arizona State University, or Northern Arizona University. Awarded to about 20 students annually, it covers tuition, housing, meals, and multiple study-abroad experiences, along with personalized mentorship and honors college enrollment. These scholars demonstrate exceptional academics, leadership, and service. Even semi-finalists may receive substantial awards from state universities, making the Flinn Scholarship a top opportunity for Arizona students.

The 65 Flinn Scholars from University High School is more than any other high school in the state of Arizona.

Diploma Recognitions

Students earned various recognitions on their diplomas including:

- ***Fine Arts Seal from the State of Arizona*** – (16) for demonstrating high levels of proficiency and completing a capstone project in their artistic discipline.
- ***Arizona Seal of Biliteracy*** – (13) for achieving proficiency in both English and at least one additional language as demonstrated through examination.
- ***Arizona State Seal of Civics*** – (5) for demonstrating Civic Learning by maintaining academic excellence in their social studies coursework receiving passing scores on the Arizona Civics Exam, and with community service.
- ***Arizona State Seal of Personal Finance*** – (1) for completion of personal finance coursework, passing a personal finance exam, participation in at least one extracurricular outside of school, and creation of a college and career readiness plan, applying the finance principles which they learned about into their future

Scholars

Advanced Placement

- **AP Scholars** – (43) students received a score of 3 or higher on three or more AP exams
- **AP Scholar with Honors** – (16) students received an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP exams and a score of 3 or higher on four or more AP exams
- **AP Scholar with Distinction** – (84) students received an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP exams and a score of 3 or higher on five or more AP exams

College Board National Recognition Programs

(69) students were recognized by the College Board's National Recognition Program, which honors students from underrepresented groups who have excelled on their PSAT and AP exams, and in the classroom. These awards often lead to significant scholarships opportunities and the title of National African American, Hispanic, and/or Indigenous Scholar.

National Merit Scholars

The National Merit Scholars Program identifies students who score above a set percentile on their PSAT. Students that meet this requirement are then afforded the opportunity to compete for a National Merit Scholarship and be named a National Merit Scholar. This year, UHS had (2) **National Merit Semifinalists** and (15) **National Merit Finalists**.
